

INTERDEPARTMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN
THE OFFICE OF THE MAYOR AND
THE MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEMS DEPARTMENT

THIS INTERDEPARTMENTAL AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) is made between The Office of the Mayor of the City of Racine (“Mayor’s Office”) and the City of Racine Management Information Systems Department (“Department”).

WHEREAS, the 2021 American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) provided funding to the City from the Coronavirus State and Local Recovery Fund (“SLFRF”), (hereinafter called “ARPA funding”);

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Treasury is the federal agency that administers the ARPA funding and has provided the City with the ARPA funding conditional on the City complying with its rules and regulations;

WHEREAS, the City has established a process for City agencies and organizations external to the City to apply for ARPA funding;

WHEREAS, the Mayor Office has administered the process for ARPA funding and recommends the Department receive ARPA funding for its program as described in this Agreement;

WHEREAS, the Mayor’s Office and the Department wish to enter into this Agreement to memorialize each other’s responsibilities in regard to the ARPA funding for the program; and

NOW, THEREFORE, that in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

A. PURPOSE

The Mayor’s Office hereby agrees to provide ARPA funding, in the amount set forth herein, to the Department to facilitate the implementation of the program.

B. SCOPE OF PROGRAM

Department shall implement the program, including any milestones and deliverables, as described in **Exhibit 1**, which is appended hereto and made a part of this Agreement.

C. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall begin on December 1, 2024, and end on December 31, 2026, unless terminated earlier in accordance with this Agreement.

D. FINANCIAL AND PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

1. *Funding.* Subject to the availability of ARPA funding, the Mayor's Office shall provide funds to the Department for the program, in an amount not to exceed two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00) for the term. Any expenses/costs incurred by Department more than this amount shall be the sole responsibility of Department.

2. *Budget.* The Department agrees that all expenditures are to be in accordance with the approved budget for the term of this Agreement. The approved budget is part of the proposal at **Exhibit 1**.

3. *Payment.* The City shall make ARPA funding as specified in this Agreement available for use. The ARPA funding shall be used to provide the services described in this Agreement and in **Exhibit 1**. The Department shall comply with the ARPA funding requirements listed at **Exhibits 2 and 3**. Any ARPA funding advanced to Department prior to the execution of this Agreement which is related to this Agreement is subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

4. *Reporting.* The Department agrees to provide supporting documents and corresponding reports as requested by the U.S. Department of the Treasury and the Mayor's Office to meet any reporting deadlines. The Department shall adhere to the instructions and format, including specific forms required by the Mayor's Office and the U.S. Department of Treasury for the ARPA funding. Reporting terms and conditions are provided in **Exhibit 4**.

5. *Audits.* The Department shall comply with all applicable provisions of the federal Uniform Guidance (2 CFR 200), including the Cost Principles and Single Audit Act requirements. At any time during business hours and as often as the city, state, or federal agencies may deem necessary, there shall be made available to the government agency for examination, the Department's records with respect to matters covered by this Agreement. The Department shall permit city, state, or federal agencies to audit, examine, and make excerpts or transcripts from such records, and to make audits of all contracts, invoices, materials, records of personnel, conditions of employment and other data relating to matters covered by this Agreement.

6. *Records.* The Department shall retain records related to this Agreement for a period of five years after all funds have been expended or returned to the U.S. Department of Treasury, whichever is later.

7. *Subrecipients and Grantees Prohibited.* The Department shall not make ARPA funding available to any subrecipients or grantees.

E. CORRECTIVE ACTION AND TERMINATION

1. *Corrective Action.* Upon written notice, the Mayor's Office may require the Department to take corrective action so the Department is complying with city, state, or federal laws, regulations, or rules related to the ARPA funding for the program. Corrective action may

be required for but is not limited to instances in which the Department: (a) fails to file a report, (b) fails to meet performance standards, (c) fails to meet milestones or timelines, or (d) misuses funds. The Mayor's Office may require corrective action of the Department, including but not be limited to: (a) a written warning, (b) additional technical assistance, (c) additional monitoring, (d) program suspension, and (e) reduction/repayment of funding.

2. *Termination.* Either party may terminate this Agreement by giving to the other party written notification prior to termination. Upon termination, the parties hereto agree that all reports and supporting documentation required for services rendered pursuant to this Agreement shall be provided to the Mayor's Office forthwith. Any funds advanced to the Department for services not yet rendered shall be returned to the Mayor's Office immediately.

F. MODIFICATIONS AND AMENDMENTS

The Department may submit a written request to the Mayor's Office asking for (i) an extension to the term of this Agreement; and/or (ii) a budget reallocation not to exceed 25 percent of the ARPA funding for this program. The request shall include an explanation for why an extension and/or program budget reallocation is needed and be provided to the Mayor's Office at least 60 days prior to the expiration date of this Agreement. The request must include all required documentation to justify the need for an extension and/or reallocation. The Mayor's Office will approve or deny the request in writing. The Department may not expend the ARPA funding under a reallocated program budget until such time the Department has received written approval from the Mayor's Office. Any additional funds or other modifications may be added to this Agreement by written Amendment setting forth the modifications/amendments signed by the parties.

G. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND CONDITIONS

1. *Compliance with Laws.* The parties shall comply with all local, state, and federal laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, interim expenditure and annual report requirements, and applicable codes of ethics, pertaining to or regulating the services to be performed pursuant to this Agreement, including those now in effect and hereafter adopted. Any violation of such laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, or applicable codes of ethics by the Department shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and shall entitle the Mayor's Office to terminate this Agreement immediately upon delivery of written notice of termination to the Department.

2. *Nondiscrimination.* The parties shall operate under this Agreement so that no person, otherwise qualified, is denied employment or other benefits on the grounds of age, sex, race, color, veteran's status, disabled veteran's status, religion, disability, national origin, marital status, gender identity, sexual orientation, familial status, or economic status except where a particular occupation or position reasonably requires consideration of these attributes as an essential qualification for the position. The Department shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.

3. *No Duplication of Funding.* The Department shall not use different sources of federal

funding to pay for the same services. The Department shall not use ARPA funding to pay for the same work that was reimbursed or paid by other sources of funding (e.g., FEMA or CARES funding).

4. *Governing Law and Venue.* This Agreement shall be construed by and governed under the laws of the State of Wisconsin and subject to the jurisdiction of a court of competent jurisdiction in Racine County, Wisconsin.

5. *No Assignment.* This Agreement shall not be assigned by the Department to another party without the prior written approval of the Mayor's Office. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto and their successors and assigns.

6. *Notice.* Any notice required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in writing, be delivered by a reasonable and verifiable means (e.g., in person, mail, or e-mail) and be considered delivered upon receipt of the other party.

8. *Incorporation.* The recitals and exhibits are hereby incorporated as part of this Agreement.

9. *Final Agreement.* This Agreement constitutes the entire, full, and final understanding between the parties hereto and neither party shall be bound by any representations, statements, promises, or agreements not expressly set forth herein.

EXHIBIT 1

SCOPE OF WORK

Smart City Initiative

In 2019, the City of Racine was awarded Smart City (SC) designation to continue to make Racine more livable, equitable and sustainable through technology. Residents need to know how to use a computer and the internet for the City of Racine to be a Smart City. In 2024, the City of Racine's Digital Equity Plan was written detailing activities to provide equitable access to broadband internet, devices, and essential digital literacy skills to reduce the number of people living in poverty, increase the employability of residents, provide educational opportunities, and increase wages. Goal: all city residents can partake in our modern digital society. This is step 1 for an inclusive Smart City.

The Smart City Initiative hires part-time student interns. Interns will continue to expand the **Digital Divide Roundtable** (DDR – currently with 60+ organizations) and implement the **Digital Equity Plan** which includes making the DDR a community coalition (not one run by the City of Racine), continue the digital navigator programs, and supporting of **2nd annual Digital Literacy Fair**. SC Interns will serve as a vital **bridge** between the community and city officials, providing feedback on community concerns and suggestions, which enhances responsiveness, improves decision-making, enables effective solutions, and builds resident's trust. *SC Community Engagement Intern* will expand outreach efforts, engage underrepresented groups, ensure that diverse voices are included in the Smart City conversations, so that all Racine residents benefit from a **digitally inclusive city**. *SC Research Interns* will continue to establish and **nurture partnerships** with non-profit organizations, businesses, and educational institutions, creating a more collaborative environment for community development and city support. *SC Marketing intern* will develop and implement Social Media campaigns and update the city's **Digital Inclusion (DI) Storymap** with computer training links, use tips, and answers to questions to more efficiently offer digital literacy. Since the grant we received has no marketing funds, it will be publicized to get applicants and tout its success. They will also provide Spanish versions of graphics, social media posts and documents (not just SC) to reach a broader audience. Our ongoing efforts to **engage the Hispanic/Latino community** will continue to build trust and increased effective support. *SC GIS intern* will maintain the Smart City and DI Storymaps and the **Technology Training Dashboard**, along with all current and new maps – public Wi-Fi, DDR members, training locations, broadband speeds. New maps will reflect the digital inclusion grant effectiveness – device distribution, organizational partnerships, and training participation.

With only \$200,000 available, we will complete all our work in 2025.

AWARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

CORONAVIRUS STATE FISCAL RECOVERY FUND
AWARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Use of Funds.

- a. Recipient understands and agrees that the funds disbursed under this award may only be used in compliance with sections 602(c) and 603(c) of the Social Security Act (the Act) and Treasury's regulations implementing that section and guidance.
- b. Recipient will determine prior to engaging in any project using this assistance that it has the institutional, managerial, and financial capability to ensure proper planning, management, and completion of such project.

2. Period of Performance. The period of performance for this award begins on the date hereof and ends on December 31, 2026. As set forth in Treasury's implementing regulations, Recipient may use award funds to cover eligible costs incurred during the period that begins on March 3, 2021 and ends on December 31, 2024.

3. Reporting. Recipient agrees to comply with any reporting obligations established by Treasury, as it relates to this award.

4. Maintenance of and Access to Records

- a. Recipient shall maintain records and financial documents sufficient to evidence compliance with sections 602(c) and 603(c), Treasury's regulations implementing those sections, and guidance regarding the eligible uses of funds.
- b. The Treasury Office of Inspector General and the Government Accountability Office, or their authorized representatives, shall have the right of access to records (electronic and otherwise) of Recipient in order to conduct audits or other investigations.
- c. Records shall be maintained by Recipient for a period of five (5) years after all funds have been expended or returned to Treasury, whichever is later.

5. Pre-award Costs. Pre-award costs, as defined in 2 C.F.R. § 200.458, may not be paid with funding from this award.

6. Administrative Costs. Recipient may use funds provided under this award to cover both direct and indirect costs.

7. Cost Sharing. Cost sharing or matching funds are not required to be provided by Recipient.

8. Conflicts of Interest. Recipient understands and agrees it must maintain a conflict of interest policy consistent with 2 C.F.R. § 200.318(c) and that such conflict of interest policy is applicable to each activity funded under this award. Recipient and subrecipients must disclose in writing to Treasury or the pass-through entity, as appropriate, any potential conflict of interest affecting the awarded funds in accordance with 2 C.F.R. § 200.112.

9. Compliance with Applicable Law and Regulations.

- a. Recipient agrees to comply with the requirements of sections 602 and 603 of the Act, regulations adopted by Treasury pursuant to sections 602(f) and 603(f) of the Act, and guidance issued by Treasury regarding the foregoing. Recipient also agrees to comply with all other applicable federal statutes, regulations, and executive orders, and Recipient shall provide for such compliance by other parties in any agreements it enters into with other parties relating to this award.

- i. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. §§ 2000d et seq.) and Treasury's implementing regulations at 31 C.F.R. Part 22, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin under programs or activities receiving federal financial assistance;
 - ii. The Fair Housing Act, Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. §§ 3601 et seq.), which prohibits discrimination in housing on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status, or disability;
 - iii. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. § 794), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance;
 - iv. The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. §§ 6101 et seq.), and Treasury's implementing regulations at 31 C.F.R. Part 23, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of age in programs or activities receiving federal financial assistance; and
 - v. Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, as amended (42 U.S.C. §§ 12101 et seq.), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability under programs, activities, and services provided or made available by state and local governments or instrumentalities or agencies thereto.

10. Remedial Actions. In the event of Recipient's noncompliance with sections 602 and 603 of the Act, other applicable laws, Treasury's implementing regulations, guidance, or any reporting or other program requirements, Treasury may impose additional conditions on the receipt of a subsequent tranche of future award funds, if any, or take other available remedies as set forth in 2 C.F.R. § 200.339. In the case of a violation of sections 602(c) or 603(e) of the Act regarding the use of funds, previous payments shall be subject to recoupment as provided in sections 602(e) and 603(e) of the Act.

11. Hatch Act. Recipient agrees to comply, as applicable, with requirements of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. §§ 1501-1508 and 7324-7328), which limit certain political activities of State or local government employees whose principal employment is in connection with an activity financed in whole or in part by this federal assistance.

12. False Statements. Recipient understands that making false statements or claims in connection with this award is a violation of federal law and may result in criminal, civil, or administrative sanctions, including fines, imprisonment, civil damages and penalties, debarment from participating in federal awards or contracts, and/or any other remedy available by law.

13. Publications. Any publications produced with funds from this award must display the following language: "This project [is being] [was] supported, in whole or in part, by federal award number [enter project FAIN] awarded to [] by the U.S. Department of the Treasury."

14. Debts Owed the Federal Government.

- a. Any funds paid to Recipient (1) in excess of the amount to which Recipient is finally determined to be authorized to retain under the terms of this award; (2) that are determined by the Treasury Office of Inspector General to have been misused; or (3) that are determined by Treasury to be subject to a repayment obligation pursuant to sections 602(e) and 603(e) of the Act and have not been repaid by Recipient shall constitute a debt to the federal government.
- b. Any debts determined to be owed the federal government must be paid promptly by Recipient. A debt is delinquent if it has not been paid by the date specified in Treasury's initial written demand for payment, unless other satisfactory arrangements have been made or if the Recipient knowingly or improperly retains funds that are a debt as defined in paragraph 14(a). Treasury will take any actions available to it to collect such a debt.

15. Disclaimer.

- a. The United States expressly disclaims any and all responsibility or liability to Recipient or third persons for the actions of Recipient or third persons resulting in death, bodily injury, property damages, or any other losses resulting in any way from the performance of this award or any other losses resulting in any way from the performance of this award or any contract, or subcontract under this award.
- b. The acceptance of this award by Recipient does not in any way establish an agency relationship between the United States and Recipient.

16. Protections for Whistleblowers.

- a. In accordance with 41 U.S.C. § 4712, Recipient may not discharge, demote, or otherwise discriminate against an employee in reprisal for disclosing to any of the list of persons or entities provided below, information that the employee reasonably believes is evidence of gross mismanagement of a federal contract or grant, a gross waste of federal funds, an abuse of authority relating to a federal contract or grant, a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety, or a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a federal contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract) or grant.
- b. The list of persons and entities referenced in the paragraph above includes the following:
 - i. A member of Congress or a representative of a committee of Congress;
 - ii. An Inspector General;
 - iii. The Government Accountability Office;
 - iv. A Treasury employee responsible for contract or grant oversight or management;
 - v. An authorized official of the Department of Justice or other law enforcement agency;
 - vi. A court or grand jury; or
 - vii. A management official or other employee of Recipient, contractor, or subcontractor who has the responsibility to investigate, discover, or address misconduct.
- c. Recipient shall inform its employees in writing of the rights and remedies provided under this section, in the predominant native language of the workforce.

17. Increasing Seat Belt Use in the United States. Pursuant to Executive Order 13043, 62 FR 19217 (Apr. 18, 1997), Recipient should encourage its contractors to adopt and enforce on-the-job seat belt policies and programs for their employees when operating company-owned, rented or personally owned vehicles.

18. Reducing Text Messaging While Driving.
