Rick -

I have been working on quality of life issues in the Georgetown area recently. I have been addressing some areas with the PD, but there are two things that I think your department can help me fix.

1) Street Signs

The signage (street names and others) is in need of repair. There are signs that are bent, faded, or almost falling off the poles. They have been like this for some time and it leaves the impression that the city doesn't care about the area - a frequent complaint from my constituents there. I would like those signs to be repaired or replaced.

I have noticed a real problem with it on Biscayne Ave, but I would like all the signs in the area assessed and dealt with. (It would be nice if they could remove the tennis shoes from the poles while they are up there.)

If this project will take money that we do not currently have available, please let me know how much that is and I will work to find it for you.

2) Street Lights

There is a serious lack of street lights on the streets that run parallel to each other between Biscayne and Emstan Hills. Two of the streets have no lighting at all. I am aware that some, if not all, of the streets do not have existing poles. I would like a recommendation from your department as to how many lights there should be and a ballpark figure on the costs to do this.
