Parks

Parks Division:

- a. Set up and cleanup for Duck Derby at Island Park

- c. Approximately 200 man hours spent on 4th of July at North Beach set up
- d. Graffiti was removed at Johnson Park picnic shelter on two occasions
- e. Flail mowed at Island Park, Johnson Dog Run, Johnson Park trails, and the Michigan Blvd. hill top from Hoffert Drive north to past the Zoo
- f. Upkeep of mowing and all litter routes

Forestry Division:

- a. Emerald ash borer treatments began June 5
 - 1. 610 ash trees were treated during the month of June
 - 2. 313 trees remain to be treated in July
- b. 126 trees were removed; some of which were storm damaged; several were removed along the parade route to ensure safety
- c. 174 trees were pruned, including along the parade route to ensure safety and pedestrian/vehicle clearance
- d. Crews responded to over 100 storm damage locations over the course of multiple wind events

- e. Several road construction projects started which require the removal of 52 public trees (to be completed by contractors)
 - Tree protection fencing was installed at 11 locations along Cleveland Avenue as part of an experimental project; the goal of which is to protect public trees from construction impacts


- a. The Summer Lunch Program started on June 12 serving about 45 lunches a day
