Parks Division

Forestry Division

- a) Ash Logging Project: Clean-up at Johnson Park and Colonial Park is underway. Clean-up at Johnson Dog Run is complete.
- b) Approximately 250 inventoried trees were pruned.
- c) Approximately 70 inventoried trees were removed.
- d) Arborists participated in Customer Service training, Work Zone Safety training, and completed annual Hearing Tests.
- e) Olson Prairie: understory brush along the perimeter and non-desirable species throughout the prairie were removed.
- f) Two new arborists started basic training/orientation is underway.
- g) Planning/preparation for spring tree planting is underway.
- h) The city forester staffed a booth at EcoFest, talked to high school students about careers in urban forestry/arboriculture, assisted with an arboriculture class at Gateway's Racine campus, and made a presentation about tree inventories at the Urban Ecology Center in Milwaukee.

Cesar Chavez



- h) Chavez Center currently has 17 paid practices for AAU/traveling teams in the evenings using both gyms.




- a) Bryant Center hosted an Easter Egg Hunt and party with activities.
- b) Our presentation of Remember the Times was a hit. Many of the children's parents were out to support this great event.




- a) Spring sports started. Finalized supervisors and scorekeepers at Pershing and Horlick Field.b) AAU practices 6 days a week at TDCC



















