Dear Assistant Chief Wolf,

Thank you for submitting an application in response to the *Mobile Integrated Health for COVID and Stroke*. The review committee has recommended your application for funding for the period of March 1, 2022 – February 28, 2023.

The review panel noted strengths and weaknesses from your application as shown below.

Application Strengths

- The need for this program is clearly established by providing Racine's statistics surrounding the increase in Racine Fire Department's (RFD) call volume, stroke and COVID hospital admissions, COVID vaccination rates, and the poverty level of its municipality.
- The application does an exemplary job highlighting RFD Mobile Integrated Health (MIH) project's high level of qualification, strong partnerships, and record of success, which demonstrate preparedness and capacity to incorporate *MIH for COVID and Stroke* into their existing program.
- The additional efforts of the MIH team meeting with patients prior to discharge and the post-MIH visit referrals to other services, such as community resources and behavioral health, speak directly to the MIH crew's mission in providing quality, effective care and making sure patients feel safe and properly cared for. This follow-up with patients, clinical and community partners, illustrates the comprehensive nature of the work being proposed and provided.
- The potential challenges pertaining to COVID related concerns such as the fear of infection and its politicization are addressed by the crew wearing appropriate personal protective equipment at all home visits and having consistent COVID messaging and informational resources readily available and obtainable for the patients
- The organizational structure of RFD's MIH team, including hospital partners, is well outlined, describing different members of the team's roles and respective tasks, showing an efficient workflow.

Application Weaknesses

• The application states eligible MIH participants are "patients that have had a stroke or have COVID-19 health disparities..." It is important to follow the protocol of this project, that the patient receiving MIH care must be a stroke patient recently discharged to home.

- The first at-home MIH visit that is outlined in the application does not include obtaining the required data deliverables provided in Attachment A of the GFO. This data set is necessary for the reporting of this grant.
- The goal of mitigating and preventing future problems relative to COVID is well documented but the degree to which stroke prevention interacts with these efforts could be fleshed out more. A focus on stroke is a major goal of the project. This will be a part of the monthly calls, allowing for ongoing opportunities to discuss these activities.

The award amount allocated for participation in this project is \$30,000 and represents 100 patients seen for the performance period of March 1, 2022 – February 28, 2023. Please note that this is based on the reimbursement structure described in the Grant Funding Opportunity (GFO).

We look forward to working with you in the coming months on the *Mobile Integrated Health for COVID and Stroke* project.
