Parks Division:

Forestry Division:

- a. Crews completed the annual tree removal survey
 - I. Consists of a 'windshield survey' of all 25,000+ inventoried trees
 - II. For the calendar year, 868 trees have been identified for removal
- b. 257 trees were removed.
 - I. A significant number were 5" in diameter and smaller
- c. 1,386 trees were pruned
 - I. 90% were smaller trees that received 'structural pruning' to correct defects and establish good structure & form for future years
 - II. To date, all smaller trees in 2 of 6 tree management zones have been pruned

- a. " Movies in the Park" concluded August 1 with "Finding Dory" at Douglas Park
 - i. Over 400 people attended the National Night Out presentation
 - ii. An average of 250 people attended the series of four movies


- a. 400 people attended National Night Out at the Chavez Center on August 1

- g. We Energies energy assistance consultations from 4:00 7:00 p.m. every other Thursday through December


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
- a. National Night Out in partnership with the Mead COP House was a success

- e. Feed America School Pantry will begin on September 12 running every second Wednesday of the month throughout the school year


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
- a. A free instructional basketball program is offered on Monday afternoons

- d. ARC has been using the building for monthly board meetings



















