I. A signific a nt number were $5^{\prime \prime}$ in dia meter and smaller
c. 1,386 trees were pruned
I. $90 \%$ were sma ller trees that received 'structural pruning' to correct defects and establish good structure \& form for future years
II. To date, all smaller trees in 2 of 6 tree management zones have been pruned
