Parks Division

- a) Eight working days of snow removal om February
- b) Litter picking after snow melt
- c) Six working days at Johnson Park for logging project cleanup. 30% of the cleanup completed at Johnson Park. Cleanup at Johnson Park Dog Run and Colonial Park will follow. Project will take up to a year to complete.

Forestry Division

- a) Ash Logging Project: comprised a significant amount of the work completed in February.
 - i. The logger completed removal of 2,400+ EAB-infested ash trees located at Johnson Park, Johnson Golf Course, Johnson Dog Run, and Colonial Park.
 - ii. Forestry crews chipped the majority of the larger brush material. Additional chipping and clean-up will continue when ground conditions allow.
 - iii. Parks crews worked on more detailed clean-up of smaller debris on the golf course. Work will continue into March.

- iv. Wood generated is owned by the logger and hauling of wood started while the project was still underway. Wood that is still on-site may remain until road weight restrictions are lifted later in the spring.
- b) Approximately 71 inventoried street and park trees were pruned.
- c) Approximately 119 inventoried street and park trees were removed.
- d) Parks removed 15 tree stumps on behalf of Forestry.
- e) The majority of the Forestry crew attended the Wisconsin Arborist Association Annual Conference that was held in Green Bay.
- f) The Forestry crew received CPR/First Aid recertification training.
- g) The Forestry Division had a booth at job/career fairs located at Gateway Technical College and University of Wisconsin Stevens Point.
