Parks Division

- Kept up with Litter Routes.
- Put down growth covers at Pershing soccer field.
- Removed approximately 79 stumps.
- Removed leaves from shrubs along Ohio Street using new vac truck.
- Repaired Colonial gravel parking lot by using DPW grader and adding some fresh gravel.

Forestry Division

- Approximately 19 inventoried trees were removed.
- Approximately 626 inventoried trees were pruned.
- Crews responded to approximately 5 reports of branches down or hanging.
- The forestry mower was active in several locations (Barbee Park, Wustum Museum, Clayton Park) and has spent a significant amount of time at Colonial Park clearing underbrush and invasive species.

Youth Activities

- The Youth Hoops basketball program has completed the first half of the season. Games have gone well and have been well attended at all sites. - The Snow Sharks Ski and Snowboard season has successfully started. No weather related postponements. Over 80 youth and parents attended the first four club nights. Ten participants attended the Holiday ski trip to Cascade Mountain in Portage, WI on December 21.
- Planning is underway for spring and summer programming.
- Staff is beginning preparations and training for seasonal hiring.

Community Centers

King Center

- King Center Automotive program started December 11. Six students attended the first session.
- Christmas Potluck Dinner was held December 7. 90 people attended.
- Christmas Craft Week was held December 17, 19, 21. Youth made various crafts and snacks.
- Zumba classes will be removed from the program offerings at the end of December due to low attendance.

Humble Park

- Dad's Club held a Christmas Party on December 15 with approximately 150 participants. They
 had visits from Santa and Mrs. Claus, Disney princesses, games for kids, cookie decorating,
 ornament making. Staff will continue to work with Dad's Club in 2019.
- PRCS Youth Hoops practices are ongoing with approximately 300 participants using the gym.
- Staff hosted a post-Christmas event for kids during holiday break with food, games and activities.

Cesar Chavez

- An Energy Assistance Program will be offered at the center on an appointment basis during the winter months.
- Senior athletic programming continues to grow in both Pickleball and Volleyball with new participants coming weekly.

Bryant

- The Christmas Holiday Community Party was on December 15. 100 people participated in the family dinner and gift give away. Sponsors were Educators Credit Union and the Optimist Club.
- 26 of youth received donated tickets to The Nut Cracker on December 15.

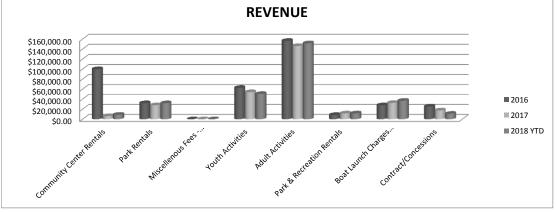
Tyler – Domer
