- City of Racine Consolidated Plan (2015-2019)
- Updated every five years (Year 5 of 5)
- CDBG, HOME, ESG
- Public planning process
- Requires simultaneous submission of an Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice

Draft Timeline

- September 20: Begin outreach activities, surveys, and hosting input sessions
 - General public survey
 - Small group structured discussions
- October 17: Formal public hearing #1
- November 15: Draft Consolidated Plan Published
- November 15-December 16: 30-day comment period on draft Consolidated Plan
- November 21: Formal public hearing #2
- January, 2020: Review of final Consolidated Plan for adoption by CD Committee/Common Council





HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)

- U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- Authorized in 1990
- To benefit Low and Moderate Income Persons
- Designed to create affordable housing

Emergency Solutions Grants Program (ESG)

- U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- Funding decisions are done in coordination with the Racine City and County Continuum of Care.
- Amended with allocations in 2011
- Programs Goals include:
 - Preventing and Reducing homelessness and incidents of homelessness
 - Rapidly moving households to permanent housing
 - Diversion from emergency shelter
